

Guideline for the authors

Only **original research abstracts** are accepted, including observational and experimental studies, meta-analyses, and case series. Abstracts must contain original unpublished material.

1. Abstracts must be submitted in **English**
2. If applicable, authors must ensure that the patient consent is obtained before submitting the abstract.
3. Original research (including meta-analyses) should have a standardized format and include the following sections: Background, Patients, Results, Discussion, and Conclusion.
4. Case series should follow a standardized format and include the following sections: Background, Case Description, Discussion, and Conclusion.
5. Each author may submit **only 1 abstract** .
6. University will chose abstracts that will be send to the MIRCIM reviewers for scientific content and quality of presentation.
7. All accepted abstracts will be displayed as digital posters during MIRCIM 2026 and published in the MIRCIM 2026 Book of Abstracts. By submitting an abstract, authors consent to its publication. Participants are requested to proofread their submissions carefully to avoid errors and check for spelling and grammar issues, as abstracts will be published exactly as received.

Technical guidelines

1. Abstracts must not exceed 500 words and may include up to 3 tables, graphs, or images. Titles and section headings do not count toward this limit.
2. Abstracts should be accompanied by a visual presentation of the abstract content that will be displayed on on-site displays during MIRCIM 2026 and online:
 - Size: 10 MB or less
 - Ratio: 9:16 (vertical)
 - Resolution: at least 1080 × 1920 px
 - Format: PDF or JPG
3. Academic titles should be omitted from authors' names.
4. Affiliations should be provided separately in the following format: *Department of XXX, University of YYY, City, Country* or *ZZZ Hospital, City, Country*.
5. Up to 3 keywords may be included.
6. Medical jargon should be avoided.
7. The use of abbreviations should be limited, with preference for those recognized internationally. Abbreviations should be spelled out at first mention except for those commonly used (eg, ECG).
8. Drug names should be written in lowercase using generic substance names rather than trade names.
9. The abstract content must remain scientific, objective, and free of promotional material.
10. Patient names, identification numbers, or other identifiable details must not be included. Figures displaying patient faces must be modified to protect anonymity (eg, eyes covered or blurred).
